Inwards Correspondence:

Speed Management Programme 2022. Manawatu District Council. We want to make our District's roads safer! So we need your feedback on some proposed low cost-low risk improvements we're looking to implement that we believe will help reduce accidents. These include:

Permanent Speed Limit changes to Halcombe Township.

Permanent Speed Limit changes to Sanson Township.

Permanent Speed Limit changes to rural roads between Feilding, Halcombe and Sanson.

30kph Variable speed limit installations for Feilding High School, Feilding Intermediate School and North Street School.

Rural Activated Intersection Warning System (RAIWS), a vehicle operated Variable Speed limit that lowers the limit when traffic is approaching an intersection (No.1 Line Longburn & Karere Rd) from the side road(s). Your feedback on these proposed improvements will be factored into our processes to ensure that we're making the best decision for all road users in these communities."

Grant responded by email to the Manawatu District Council with his feedback in regards to this.

I am very pleased that MDC has finished the speed review that was started about 6 years ago (better late than never) I for one agree with the limits in Sanson, But it doesn't concern the main issue about SH 1 and 3 with the speed into Sanson(no 100kph to 70kph then into a 50kph as When coming from Wellington into the school end of Sanson to the corner, 95% of cars, trucks, and motorbikes are still doing 90kph about 20 meters before the intersection than most think don't think they have to when

turning left giving way to cars coming through to bulls from P/north. NZTA have said this is NOT a problem. But when they came to get feedback about the Bulls- Ohakea area 99% of Sanson complained about this, and yet NZTA has not listened and said we are not going to touch it and we are only interested in the Bulls- Ohakea area. I have been on the safer roads website but it just goes to the Bulls plan. So NZTA won't listen to anyone.

New community engagement coordinator: Kyle Van de Bittner will be taking over from Aly Thompson. Kyle will take care of the core support for our neighbourhood groups, leading our CDEM support for rural communities and all our newsletters & communication with the community.
